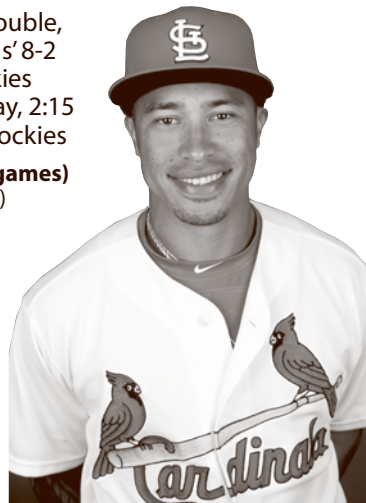

# Cavs reach deal with Rose

The long and winding basketball odyssey of Derrick Rose took its latest turn on Monday, when he agreed to a one-year deal with the Cleveland Cavaliers, according to multiple news reports.

Rose, a former NBA Most Valuable Player whose career has been hobbled by chronic knee injuries, found that the market for his services in free agency was not particularly robust. But after speaking with several teams, including the Los Angeles Lakers, Rose found a landing spot with the Cavaliers, who are in some disarray after Kyrie Irving recently requested a trade from the team.

In a low-risk, low-cost move, the Cavaliers bought themselves experience, depth and scoring by adding Rose, 28. The question is whether he can stay healthy. Rose has had four knee surgeries in the past six years, his latest coming in April after he suffered a torn meniscus in his left knee while playing for the New York Knicks.

The Cavaliers sought Rose after Irving, their starting point guard, informed them that he wanted out of Cleveland after spending the first six seasons of his career with the team.

It was a stunning development. Alongside LeBron James, Irving had led the Cavaliers to three straight appearances in the NBA Finals. In 2016, he helped deliver the franchise's first championship. But he appears eager to escape James' colossal shadow, even if it leads to the eventual dissolution of one of the league's top teams.

It remains to be seen how the Cavaliers will handle Irving's

request — he has two guaranteed years remaining on his contract — but the acquisition of Rose at least gives them some insurance in the backcourt.

The No. 1 overall pick in the 2008 NBA draft, Rose was once the game's most dynamic playmaker. During the 2010-11 season, he averaged 25 points, 7.7 assists and 3.1 rebounds, and towed the Chicago Bulls to the Eastern Conference finals. He also became the youngest player to win the league's MVP Award, at 22.

But in the first round of the 2012 playoffs, Rose suffered his first major setback when he tore the anterior cruciate ligament in his left knee. He missed the following season as a result of the injury. In November 2013, he tore the meniscus in his right knee and missed the rest of that season. He sustained the same injury in February 2015.

Before last season, the Knicks acquired Rose in a trade with the Bulls. Rose appeared to have high hopes, going so far as to describe the Knicks as a "superteam." But that was before he had even appeared in uniform for them. His time in New York would prove to be largely disappointing, marred by off-court distractions, lots of losses and more injury woes.

Rose missed several weeks of training camp when he was a defendant in a civil trial in which he and two friends were accused of sexual assault. A jury cleared Rose of any wrongdoing.

But Rose's absence at the start of the season seemed to hinder his adjustment to a new team — and to the triangle offense, which made him openly yearn for the days when he ran

pick-and-rolls with the Bulls. He had moments when he showed glimpses of his former, more explosive self. For the season, he averaged 18 points and 4.4 assists a game while shooting 47.1 percent from the field — his best statistical season in years.

But in January, he skipped a game at Madison Square Garden without telling anyone from the team, causing concern and confusion. At the time, the Knicks were already drifting out of play-off contention. The Knicks fined Rose but did not suspend him.

Rose wound up missing the final eight games of the season with his latest knee injury, and the Knicks finished tied for the sixth-worst record in the league at 31-51.

The Knicks, who are flush against the league's salary cap, are still searching for a veteran to mentor Frank Ntilikina, the 18-year-old point guard whom they selected with the eighth overall pick in last month's draft. One could potentially come via a trade involving Carmelo Anthony, who — much like Irving — wants a new home.

## Pau Gasol signs deal with Spurs

SAN ANTONIO — The San Antonio Spurs have signed Pau Gasol to a three-year contract.

The Spurs announced the signing on Monday. Gasol opted out of the two-year deal he signed last summer to give the Spurs more salary cap flexibility to supplement the roster in free agency. But he always intended to re-sign with San Antonio, where he averaged 12.4 points and 7.8 rebounds in just over 25 minutes per game last season.

Asked if there might come a time when one of those disciplines might squeeze out the other, she said, "Surfing will win, as much as I like college, I can always go back if I have to take time off to travel (in surfing competitions)."

Steele won the Honolii event two years ago, her first World Surfing League victory. This time, she intends to use her entry fee and airfare for the Wahine Pipe Pro event next spring.

For Nakoia Kuamoo-Mendiola, qualifying out of the men's open division was another indication that the ambitious goals he maintains for the years ahead really are achievable.

"It was a huge thing for me to get this opportunity to compete in Oahu and get some good exposure, I couldn't have asked for any more than this," he said. "I went into it looking for long rides, big turns and radical maneuvers and the conditions were great. I think I got everything I wanted out of it."

He thanked Pro-Am organizer Stan Lawrence, all the officials, his sponsors and the other competitors, including Shayden Pacarro, winner of the men's open event.

"He's been like a big brother to me," Kuamoo-Mendiola said, "he taught me some things along the way, but mostly I learned just from watching him."

A rising senior at Waiakea High School, Kuamoo-Mendiola has his sights set on a busy future, hoping to study marine biology at BYU-Hawaii while pursuing a career as a professional surfer.

"It's possible," he said, "It can be done, at least, that's my plan. I love marine biology and on Oahu I can do both."

His "big brother" Pacarro is heading back to elite competition with a brace of confidence after winning at Honolii.

"I was so stoked out there, the waves were fun, it was perfect," said Pacarro, 20, a Puna resident who attended Pahoia High School and then transferred to Keaau, where he graduated. "I grew up surfing at Honolii, so it's a special place for me. We want people to know that it's not just Kona that has surfers here. We have a new group, a young generation coming up here on the Big Island."

Pacarro's goal is the Triple Crown, the goal of every serious surfer, and it's one he almost

realized a year ago on Oahu in a contest for the series of world class competitions, but he came up one spot short.

"One spot, man," Pacarro said, "but it's all good, thanks to Stan and this incredible gift of a round trip ticket and an entry fee paid up, I have another chance."

Pacarro has been going hard at it the past five years, trying to secure a steady position in world class events and compete for the Triple Crown, surfing's World Series of events at the Reef Hawaiian Pro at Haleiwa, the O'Neill World Cup of Surfing at Sunset Beach, and the Billabong Pipeline Masters at the Banzai Pipeline.

Coming close to qualification a year ago is confidence for this year.

"I had never been in that situation, I'm more familiar with what to expect now," Pacarro said, "but still, it's a big stage, like last year I was in a stage with Kelly Slater and it was like, 'Whoa, this is the big time, I'm here.'"

"I think it will just help a little because I kind of know what to expect now," he said, "but at that level, nothing is easy for anyone."
